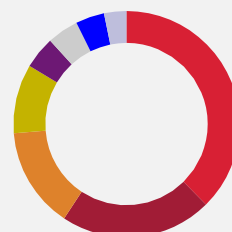

## market commentary

Index-linked UK government bonds (Gilts) posted positive returns and outperformed nominal Gilts over the period. Ten-year UK inflation breakevens (the yield differential between nominal and inflation-linked government bonds of the same maturity) widened over the quarter, driven by the depreciation in sterling and expectations of an accommodative fiscal policy. Ten-year nominal government bond (Gilt) yields also fell below 0.5%, below the previous trough in August 2016. The political atmosphere in the UK remained volatile as the new Prime Minister Boris Johnson suspended parliament for more than a month before Brexit. However, the decision was later overturned by the Supreme Court, which resulted in a small rise in 10-year Gilt yields. On the policy front, the Bank of England kept interest rates on hold at 0.75% and signalled that prolonged Brexit uncertainty will keep interest rates lower for longer.

## About the factsheet
